### Dear Parish Family-

In one month's time Bishop David M. O'Connell will open the first phase of the 16<sup>th</sup> Ordinary Synod of Bishops. The theme for the World Synod of Bishop's meeting in Rome in 2023 is 'A Synodal Church'. This World Synod of Bishop's meeting is unique because it has three phases. The Diocesan phase, regional phase and universal phase. When the Bishops of the World Meet they will then synthesize all three phases and make a series of recommendations to the Holy Father who will then make the final decision sent to the whole Church in the form of an Apostolic Exhortation, essentially a letter binding all Catholics to the decisions made in Synod.

Pope Francis has chosen to open the working of the Synod to every baptized member of the Church and wishes broad consultation from around the world. He has expressed a strong desire to hear from the "Sensus Fidei", the sense the People of God have as part of their Baptism call.

In the document In Episcopalis communio, Pope Francis cautioned that the sensus fidei should not be confused with the changing currents of public opinion; "An authentic expression is one that is in continuity with magisterial teaching, comes from a life formed by the Word of God in the heart of the Church, and which seeks not only one's own salvation but the salvation of others for the edification of the Church and the advancement of the Kingdom of God."

I am sure many people wonder what a Synod is to begin with! According to Pope Francis's simple definition, a Synod is defined specifically as <u>"the action of the Spirit in the communion of the Body of Christ and in the missionary journey of the People of God,"</u>

St. Cyprian of Carthage (mid 300 A.D.) formulated the essence of the Synodal principle that must rule its life and mission locally and at a universal level: "while nothing should be done in the local Church without the Bishop - nihil sine episcopo - it is equally true that nothing should be done without your council (the Presbyters & Deacons) - nihil sine consilio vestro - or without the consensus of the people - et sine consensu plebis - always holding firm to the rule according to which episcopatus unus est cuius a singulis in solidum pars tenetur" (the episcopate is one, of which each member has an undivided share).

Synod is a word that comes to us from the Greek meaning 'to walk along a path together'; Pope Francis simply calls it "walking together". The life of faith is a Pilgrimage, a path we set our feet upon to reach the destination of heaven; we do not walk this path alone but with one another. So the word Synod appropriately describes the Christian Life as a communal movement guided by the light of the Holy Spirit. In the context of Church structures is a consultative body that assists the Pope in guiding the Church along an authentic path in conformity with the Holy Scripture and Tradition.

The Synod of Bishops was established as a formal structure of the Church by St. Pope Paul VI after the conclusion of Vatican Council II. The Council breathed new life into an ancient model of how to be Church. You see the words "Synod" (from the Greek language) and the word "Council" (from the Roman Language) are essentially the same deliberative and consultative bodies. These deliberative bodies, be they called Synod or Council, are ancient structures going back to Apostolic times. The very first Synod we call the Council of Jerusalem which took place in the City of Jerusalem with the College of Apostles with St. Peter as its head. The process and account can be found in the New Testament Book, Acts of the Apostles. The skeletal structure of this Synod can still be found in the structures of Councils and Synods throughout Catholic History. They have always been used to clarify, update, develop, enrich, confront or clarify various aspects of the Life of the Church.

Since Vatican II we have used the words Council and Synod in a more precise way to describe two different consultative bodies. We now use the word 'Council' to refer to an Ecumenical (from the Greek word 'Oikoumeniko's meaning Universal or general) gathering of the Worlds Bishop's (example being Vatican II) together with the Pope; these are large and rare meetings which are comprehensive in nature and sweeping in their implementations. It would not be practical or advisable to call these gatherings regularly, in the 2000 plus years of the Church history there have only been about 21 of them.

The Word Synod now refers to various smaller gatherings. Dioceses have Synods to update Legislative and other acts. Our last Diocesan Synod was the 4<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Synod in the 1980's. Our Diocese will celebrate its 140<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this year but has only had 4 Synods in its history. That is because these are multi-year events that are comprehensive and both time and labor intensive.

St. Pope Paul VI, at the urging of Vatican II's Dogmatic Constitution on the Church 'Lumen Gentium' established the Ordinary Synod of Bishop's as a permanent consultative body to assist the Bishop of Rome (the Pope) in guiding the Church. In the 50+ years since Vatican II the Pope's have called 14 Synods for the Universal Church. For many decades this body has primarily consisted of elected members (Bishops) from each of the World's Episcopal Conferences. Episcopal Conferences are the National Meetings of Bishops in each Nation. In the United States of America we have the 'National Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) which meets bi-annually; one meeting typically in June, and another typically in November.

The Holy Father Francis has decided to cast his net wider for the next Ordinary Synod of Bishops in 2023. For the Next Synod of Bishops he wishes to have as broad a consultation as possible thus he has divided the Synod into three phases. In October the Diocesan Phases will open on the same day throughout the World, Sunday October 17, 2021 with a Mass, ours will be celebrated by the Bishop O'Connell and will take place at St. Mary of the Assumption Cathedral in the City of Trenton at 3pm.

At the Conclusion of the first Diocesan Phase the information gathered will be passed on to the second Phase, the regional gathering of the Episcopal Conferences who will in turn collate and edit the material passing it on to the third and final Phase the World Gathering of Bishops in 2023 who will further distill the information gathered and present it to the Holy Father for his consideration fulfilling the structure St. Cyprian formulated.

Finally, as the International Theological Commission stated about Synodality, it "invites us to articulate synodal communion in terms of "all", "some" and "one". On different levels and in different forms, as local Churches, regional groupings of local Churches and the universal Church, synodality involves the exercise of the *sensus fidei* of the *universitas fidelium* (all), the ministry of leadership of the college of Bishops, each one with his presbyterium (some), and the ministry of unity of the Bishop of Rome (one). The dynamic of synodality thus joins the communitarian aspect which includes the whole People of God, the collegial dimension that is part of the exercise of Episcopal ministry, and the primatial ministry of the Bishop of Rome.

A synodal Church is a Church of participation and co-responsibility. In exercising synodality she is called to give expression to the participation of all, according to each one's calling, with the authority conferred by Christ on the College of Bishops headed by the Pope. Participation is based on the fact that all the faithful are qualified and called to serve each other through the gifts they have all received from the Holy Spirit. The authority of Pastors is a specific gift of the Spirit of Christ the Head for the up building of the entire Body, not a delegated and representative function of the people.

Listening as a community to what the Spirit is saying to the Church through the Word of God which resonates in their situation, and interpreting the signs of the times with the eyes of faith. In the synodal Church the whole community, in the free and rich diversity of its members, is called together to pray, listen, analyze, dialogue, discern and offer advice on taking pastoral decisions which correspond as closely as possible to God's will. So, in coming to formulate their own decisions, Pastors must listen carefully to the wishes (vota) of the faithful. It is necessary to distinguish between the process of decision-making through a joint exercise of discernment, consultation and co-operation, and decision-taking, which is within the competence of the Bishop, the guarantor of apostolicity and Catholicity."

The Holy Father invites each of us to participate in the decision-making process of discernment, consultation and co-operation so that he, as chief shepherd of the Lord's flock, as decision-taker, may do so in a way that guarantees fidelity to Christ, Apostolicity and Catholicity.

In expanding the Synodal process the Holy Father has put into action an Apostolic Canons (early document of the Church on governance), "but the first among them  $(\pi\rho \acute{o}\tau o\varsigma)$  must do nothing without the consensus of all". I hope this helps to better understand what a Synod is in the life of the Church and how important it is for all of us to contribute to the upcoming Ordinary Synod of Bishops in 2023 by offering our reflections and decision-making during the first phase.
